

## Church is for Every-Body

"To everything there is a season", writes King Solomon in the Book of Ecclesiastes—"A time to weep and a time to laugh; A time to mourn and a time to dance."

Beginning on Sept 7 our parish hall will open its doors to a four-session dance program called Dance For Everyone. Sponsored by Pen Bay Community Health and Wellness, our saying "yes" to hosting reflects St Thomas' commitment to partnering with our local hospital, on behalf of whole person wellness.

Instructor Katie Tranzillo has been a dance instructor for over 16 years, combining movement and music in accessible ways, so that her students feel safe and comfortable. Dance for Everyone enables people with movement difficulties to pursue fitness in a creative, life-giving way.

St Thomas' is a worshipping community that provides hospitality and sanctuary for so many folks in our neighborhoods. 12 step meetings, wellness classes, music concerts, educational forums—all

combined, there's good, healthy energy all around! As a parish family we care that people are fed spiritually, emotionally and physically.

The stones of our church become living stones as we continue to provide welcome, and we show that we are a House of Prayer for all peoples.

Stop by sometime and greet the Thursday morning participants of the Dance For Everyone class. In offering a St Thomas welcome, we share the love of God.

## Stewardship

**A** person doesn't begin to build a house by first putting up the roof to keep out the rain. That would not make sense to any of us. My old neighborhood in Topsham where I grew up is now full of houses that aren't old, but aren't new either. But I remember the neighborhood when they were still building those houses. First they dug a hole, and then they poured the concrete. The children of the neighborhood waited impatiently while the cement "set"—not understanding how important the foundation was to the whole building, or why the workers took so long to make sure it was firm. Saint Benedict once said, "You need to build the foundation to reach the top."

We teach our children "foundational" rules to live by long before they begin school. My father and mother didn't teach my brother and sister and I that the first rule in life was to get as many things as we could, and then hold onto them tenaciously. Instead, we heard over and over that we had to learn to share.



Fast forward: a mentor of mine taught me that the hardest thing in life I would ever learn--and the most important-- was how to give with as much willingness as when I "got". He believed that we spend so much of our lives learning how good it feels to work for things—status, recognition and money, that we forget there's another equally important thing to learn—how to let it go. To release, especially to release our *money*, seems to be the hardest thing for us. We easily see the wisdom of learning to give of our goods, give of our things, give of our love—but giving our money is challenging.

I remember learning to swim. I started by holding on to the side of the pool, and it took me awhile to realize that in order to learn how to swim, I needed to actually let go of the side of the pool, but I was scared. When I finally learned to let go of the safety of the pool edge, I discovered a whole new freedom; the freedom of learning to swim.

Even though letting go is the most important things that we learn in life, we resist. We fear what will happen. Fear always holds us back. Jesus said over and over again, "Fear not." The angels said, "Fear not." God says, "Do not be afraid." Maybe they know something we don't know. Maybe it's not scary to give at all. Maybe letting go of some of what we receive will bring us new freedoms we can't as yet picture.

Giving brings freedom. A paradox, yes. But in paradox we find truth. Join me in giving freely and joyously this during this year's stewardship campaign.

## Celebration of New Ministry

the trust of those who have chosen you. Care alike for young and old, strong and weak, rich and poor. By your words, and in your life, proclaim the Gospel. Love and serve Christ's people. Nourish them, and strengthen them to glorify God in this life and in the life to come."

Afterwards a special reception was held in the Parish Hall with an enormous apple spice cake and St. Thomas' famous chicken salad, among other refreshments. A good time was had by all!



## Bishop Lane to Retire

The Rt. Rev Stephen Lane has decided to retire as Bishop in June of 2019. He has called for the election of a Bishop Diocesan to be the 10th Bishop of Maine.

At the upcoming 2017 Diocesan Convention, the Standing Committee will present a resolution concerning discernment and transition, and the proposed Diocesan Council budget will include monies for that.

Bishop Lane writes: *"Serving as your bishop is the greatest joy of my life in the Church, and I look forward to continuing that service for the next two years. The work of following Jesus goes on even as we make preparations for our diocesan future, and I will remain fully engaged as your bishop until the moment I pass the crozier to my successor. There will be time for farewells as part of the transition process."*

This announcement initiates a long and careful process. All Maine Episcopalians are asked to take part, through prayer and discernment, and by continuing the faithful work and worship that are going on all over the diocese. The Bishop asks for our prayers, and promises his as we make this journey together.

Nearly 75 volunteers came from those and many other churches to serve nearly 1000 individuals last year.

The good news is we are now able to serve more people. The bad news: the pantry will shortly run out of room for both dry goods and cold storage. We need additional space to meet current needs, anticipate future needs, and protect goods from spoilage. After careful review, the Food Pantry has decided to expand the building on Mount Battie Street in Camden to better serve our clients. The cost is \$100,000. We feel it is important to reserve existing funds for food products, personal items, and free biblical publications, so we have set a goal of raising \$50,000 over the next 12 months. We will be seeking funding from capital grants, donations from local organizations and

businesses, contributions from the towns we serve, and, most importantly, from the five churches that make up our Food Pantry Board and Service Teams.

Please consider making a special contribution as we focus on helping our neighbors in need.
