

Adult Lenten Forum

The Lenten Forum Series continues this Sunday at 11 AM in the Guild Room. Jesus' statement, "I am the Bread of Life," which had been scheduled as the topic for last week's discussion, will be our topic this morning. All are welcome to participate in this informal discussion.

Noon Music in Lent

Our Noon Music in Lent program continues on Fridays throughout Lent. Come and hear members of our community perform a half hour of music, then enjoy fellowship and a lunch of soup and bread in the Parish Hall. The free-will offering benefits the Camden Area Christian Food Pantry.

This week's program features music by John Mehrmann. John has written music for the Bangor Symphony, the Portland Symphony's Kinderkonzerts, music for film, commercials for Reebok, and choral works for VoXX: Voice of Twenty, of which he is currently music director. His music has been described as "lyric, poignant and, at times, very noble" by Grammy-winning conductor Lucas Richman. He teaches at The University of Maine at Augusta and Bay Chamber Music School.

Today's Music

We have journeyed to mid-Lent: today's lessons are tough as well as enormously hopeful!

Our entrance hymn, Lift high the cross, sounds both in text and music as if it had been written recently. However, the words were written by G.W. Kitchen in 1887, and we sing M.R. Newbolt's 1916 update. Sydney H. Nicholson (1875-1947) wrote the stirring music specifically for this text. It wonderfully alternates between the unison refrain (with Richard Proulx's soaring descant) and the 4part harmony stanzas. The tune name, Crucifer, alludes to both the person who is crucifer in a liturgical procession, as well as to each Christian who bears the cross as a baptismal sign. The sequence hymn is a delightful text by Percy Dearmer (1867-1936) inspired by Isaiah 58:1-12 (worth looking up!) as well as The Sermon on the Mount. Dearmer paired it with the uplifting French carol harmonized by Martin Shaw (1875-1958). It's worth reading all the stanzas

Due to the impending snowstorm we did not have choir rehearsal this week: so, I changed our anthem to something more familiar to us; it also is very appropriate for today since the text comes straight out of the hope-filled reading from John 3:16-17. The composer, John Goss (English, 1800-1880) served as organist at St. Paul's Cathedral from 1838 until his retirement; he was professor of harmony for 47 years at the Royal Academy of Music; he was knighted by Queen Victoria in 1872; he wrote many hymns (see #410, Praise my soul, the King of heaven) along with service music and anthems, such as today's.

During communion we sing the poignant text by the infamous composer, *Anonymous*. John Bacchus Dykes (English, 1823-1876) wrote hymn tunes as well as service music and anthems. We have ten of his tunes in our hymnal: they have worn the years well. Going forth into the world we sing one of four hymns translated by John Mason Neale (1818-1866) from the long poem by Bernard of Cluny (12th century). We have been singing this text to the tune by Alexander Ewing since 1853.

Robert A. Hobby is an American church musician and composer (b. 1962) who wrote the prelude based on the lilting tune, *Shades Mountain*, written by K. Lee Scott (b. 1950). The opening of this hymn goes like this:

There in God's garden stands the Tree of Wisdom,

whose leaves hold forth the healing of the nations.

It is an exquisite text which I plan on having the Choir sing sometime. Amazingly, the text is from the early 17th century. Max Reger (German, 1873-1916) wrote the very harmonically rich setting of *From deepest woe I cry to Thee* (Hymn 151). We go forth with Johann Sebastian Bach's setting of *If thou but trust in God to guide thee* (Hymn 635).

Listen for the tune in the pedal!
