

Today's Music

Our entrance hymn was written by the American writer, Oliver Wendell Holmes (1809-1894). Holmes was a close friend of Longfellow, Bryant, Lowell and Whittier (he kept good company!). Holmes revolted against Calvinism early in life, and became an active member of King's Chapel, Boston. The tune, first published in 1821, is by Robert B. McCutchan; later adapted by Lowell Mason. As the sequence hymn we sing the beloved African-American spiritual, *There is a balm in Gilead*. The chorus (or refrain) is based on Jeremiah 8:22:

Is there no balm in Gilead? Is there no physician there? Why then has the health of my poor people not been restored? There are

only five tones (pentatonic) in this tune: G-A-B-C-D. This is not so unusual: it is true also in *Swing Low, sweet chariot* and *Steal away to Jesus*. Also, it is built in that we need to do the repeats on the chorus/ refrain. The same is true in *Go, tell it on the mountain*. David Hurd has written a spare and lilting accompaniment to support the unison singing. During communion I play Emma Lou Diemer's (American, b. 1927) pensive meditation on this spiritual.

During communion we sing an early American tune, Tender Thought, first published in the shape-note Kentucky Harmony (Harrisonburg, VA, 1816). This tune has six tones (hexatonic): C-E flat-F -G-A flat-B flat. The text is based on Psalm 139:1-11, worthy to be sung any day! We go forth into the world singing Spread, O spread, thou mighty word. This is what I refer to as a four-square hymn: 4 beats to the measure, very regular, and, it's in C Major! The text is a mashup writer, translator, writer and translator! The German tune first appeared in 1704: it, too, has had the influence of others before it got to us!

The Choir sings Chris Glass' favorite anthem by John Goss (English, 1800-1880). Goss was the son of an organist; was sent to London at the age of eleven and became a chorister at the Chapel Royal and trained under Thomas Attwood. In 1838 he succeeded Attwood as organist at St. Paul's Cathedral and remained there until his retirement and is buried in the crypt at St. Paul's. Goss taught harmony at the Royal Academy of Music for 47 years; published books on harmony, psalmody and chant and composed many anthems and settings for cathedral service music. He certainly had a way with melody and wrote beautiful lines for all four parts (soprano, alto, tenor, bass). The text is straight out of *The Book of Common Prayer*, p. 455.

The two chorale preludes, one by Bach (German, 1685-1750) and one by Dupré (French, 1886-1971) are embellishments of the German chorale tune from 1533, *Ich ruf' zu Dir (I call on Thee)*. We are not singing it today, but you can look it up in *The Hymnal 1982* (#634).

Sam Batt Owens (American, 1928-1998) enjoyed a long career as a wellknown organist, composer, and church musician. The postlude is his exuberant expression of the tune, *Promised Land*, which first appeared in *Southern Harmony* (1835). This tune is also pentatonic (five tones: E flat, F, G, A flat, B flat.) The Refrain goes like this:

I am bound for the promised land, Oh, who will come and go with me? I am bound for the promised land.
