The Fair is Coming, the Fair is Coming!



Today's Music St. Mary Magdalene July 22, 2018

This morning we sing two beloved hymns which we carried over from The Hymnal 1940 (a.k.a. "the old hymnal"). Faith of our Fathers, our entrance hymn, and The Church's one foundation, our dismissal hymn. Faith of our Fathers was written by Frederick W. Faber (English, 1814-1863), a Roman Catholic priest. The hymn text entered our hymnals in 1916; ironically it has only recently been included in the Roman Catholic hymnals. The original tune by Henri F. Hemy, was associated with a hymn to St. Catherine (hence the tune name). The Church's one foundation, was written by Samuel John Stone while a curate in Windsor. He

wrote a series of instructional hymns to illuminate to his parishioners The Apostles' Creed: this one is based on "the Holy Catholic Church: the Communion of Saints."

Stone apparently wrote his hymn in response to the "Colenso Controversy." (Very interesting....you can look it up on Wikipedia). Apparently the first Lambeth Conference of 1867 was the result of this controversy. According to a pupil of Samuel Sebastian Wesley (1810-1876), Wesley very excitedly burst into a gathering in his parlor and declared "I think this tune will be popular!" The company liked it; Wesley's mother called it Aurelia; and the rest is history. The text and tune were paired in 1868 and sung together every since.

Charles Callahan (American, b. 1951) is an organist, choir director, professor and composer of both preludes based on these tunes as well as the communion voluntary based on the early American tune, Nettleton (see Hymn #686, Come, thou fount of every blessing). The postlude is by the American, Lowell Mason (1792-1872) who composed many of the hymns in our hymnal; e.g., #691, My faith looks up to thee. Mason put together tune books which reformed American hymnody. The Handel and Haydn Society of Boston published his collection. He then became conductor of the society and went on to establish the Boston Academy of Music. It was through his efforts that music education made

its way into public schools throughout the United States. What a mensch!

The Choir sings the broad, expansive tune by John L. Hooker (American, b. 1944) which was originally written for the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Episcopal Church, St. Philip's in the Hills, Tucson. Hooker named the tune. Owen, for the rector, The Rev. Dr. Roger Owen Douglas. Douglas also let Hooker know that Parry's tune, Jerusalem (see Hymn #597) was his all time favorite. The resulting tune, Owen, is by Hooker's admission, very "Parry-esque and Edwardian." In 1993 Hooker wrote a new set of words (what we sing today) for the Installation of the Very Rev. Dr. William R. Rankin as President and Dean of Episcopal Divinity School. This tune has an even more demanding wide range than Silent Night! The Choir rises to the occasion with this glorious text.

The Feast of St. Mary Magdalene falls on this date so we get to hear wonderful lessons from Judith, 2 Corinthians and John as well as Psalm 42 which are either not at all in the regular Sunday Lectionary (Judith) or once every Leap Year (just kidding!). We also sing the "all -purpose saints hymn" (my words), #232, By all your saints still striving, popping in the stanza for Mary Magdalene. During communion we sing the lovely hymn paraphrase of Psalm 42, #658, As longs the deer for cooling streams, sung to the 18th century Scottish tune, Martyrdom. Lots of lovely, lovely tunes to carry you through this next week.
