

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Bells of Peace

TODAY! There will be a nation-wide bell-tolling (Veteran's Day) designed to honor American men and women who served 100 years ago during the First World War, and especially the 116,516 who died. Veterans Day was designated as "a day to be dedicated to the cause of world peace".

World War One ended by the signing of the armistice agreement between the warring countries at eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month of 1918. We will be ringing out the bells for peace in partnership with churches everywhere including our own Washington National Cathedral. Listen for our bells, which will toll 21 times at/or about 11 am on Sunday, November 11.

A little history lesson: "The First World War effectively ended on Nov. 11, 1918. For the victors, November 11 was immediately recognized as a day of celebration and thanksgiving. In the U.S. Armistice Day was celebrated until 1954. In the aftermath of WWII and the Korean War, Congress changed the holiday to Veterans Day in order to honor all American veterans. But not everyone agreed with the name change. "Armistice Day was sacred," WWII veteran Kurt Vonnegut wrote in his 1973 novel Breakfast of Champions. "Veterans Day is not." Veterans for Peace, an anti-war group, holds regular "Reclaim Armistice Day" events on November 11, arguing that the day was originally meant to celebrate peace, not militarism...." It was initially a day set aside to remember the horrors of war, so that the world would never repeat it. This Sunday we will ring the bells 21 times—as close to 11 as we can make it-along with many other churches, and the National Cathedral—to remember the 100th anniversary of Armistice

Today's Music Sunday, November 11, 2018

Today marks the 100th Anniversary of the signing of the agreement that ended World War I at 11:00 a.m., November 11, 1918. The music I have chosen reflects this commemoration. **Jean Langlais** (French, 1907-1991) was blind by the age of two from glaucoma, and went on to become an organist, recitalist, teacher and prolific composer. He followed in the footsteps of César Franck becoming organist at Ste. Clothilde (Paris) from 1945 to 1988. *Poem of Peace* was published in 1966.

The Choir sings a setting of the anonymous poem, Even when God is silent, found written on a basement wall in Cologne, Germany. It is a moving statement of faith by someone hiding from the Gestapo. The composer Sumner Jenkins (American, b. 1962) serves as Organist/ Choirmaster for Calvary Episcopal Church, Memphis, TN. Two things to notice about both these pieces: Poem of Peace ends very softly on a G Major chord; Even when God is silent ends with the Choir singing in unison. Profound messages of hope for us all.

During communion we sing Bygracious powers so wonderfully sheltered, Fred Pratt Green's paraphrase of the last poem written by Dietrich Bonhoeffer (German, 1906-1945) while in a Gestapo prison in Berlin. Bonhoeffer was executed a few months later on April 9, 1945. His is another deeply personal expression of deep faith and hope. We go forth into the world singing the stirring music, Jerusalem, of **Charles H.H. Parry** (English, 1848-1918). Carl P. Daw, Jr. (American, b. 1944) created the text to this tune at the request of the General Convention's Joint Commission on Peace: a hymn on world peace. Sing out with heart!
