



## **Today's Music Sunday, November 18, 2018**

Born and raised in Maine(!), **John Knowles Paine** (1839-1906) was one of the group of composers known as the *Boston Six*, which included Amy Beach, Arthur Foote, Edward MacDowell, George Chadwick and Horatio Parker. Paine studied organ and composition in Portland with Hermann Kotschmar; started composing as a teen and gave a series of recitals to raise money to study in Europe, where he consequently toured as a concert organist for three years. Returning to Boston, Paine was named Harvard's first organist and choir-master and went on to create the first music department in the United States at Harvard. Paine's compositions are harmonically rich

(which means you will need to listen very closely to hear the Old 100<sup>th</sup> tune!).

Our entrance hymn is specifically a hymn for Sunday, the Sabbath. We sing it to the delightful early 17<sup>th</sup> century German folk tune which translates as *There flew a little wood bird*. The sequence hymn, *All who love and serve your city*, may be new to you. The Rev. Dr. Erik Routley, composer, author, hymnal editor and teacher wrote this as his first hymn text; partially in response to the urban (and other) unrest in American cities in 1966. We sing his words to the tune named *Charlestown* after the city of Charleston, SC. Amos Pilsbury was a singing teacher and compiler of early American tunes, included it in *The United States Sacred Harmony* (Charleston, SC, 1799). During communion we sing another early American tune, *Resignation*, with Isaac Watts' beautiful paraphrase of the twenty-third psalm. This tune was first published in *Beauties of Harmony* (Pittsburgh, 1814). Tune was originally called *Hopewell*. During communion I also play Charles Callahan's (American, b. 1951) lovely piece based on this tune.

The Choir sings the broad, moving anthem (with the simple and profound text) by Anton Bruckner (Vienna, 1824-1896). Bruckner became an outstanding organist and improviser as well as a prolific composer of both sacred music as well as symphonic, chamber and keyboard music. Bruckner's deep faith shines through. He, too, wrote with complex harmonies and beautiful melodic lines.

We go forth into the world singing Johann Crüger's (German, 1598-1662) musically sturdy hymn of faith and thanksgiving, *Now thank we all our God*. Martin Rinckart (German, 1586-1649) wrote the text as a family tablegrace(!). Sigfrid Karg-Elert's (German, 1877-1933) composed *Marche Triomphale* based on the hymn we just sang. However, you will need to listen very attentively to find the tune, though, in all the complex harmonies and **triple forte!** (The instructions call for the *sforzando*) during the last passages; quite literally pulling out all the stops on the organ!)
