
Tidings Sunday, December 9, 2018 The Second Sunday of Advent

As we come to the end of the year, I wanted to share some much overdue financial information with you. As we con-

tinue to keep our expenses in-check and our parishioners continue to generously support St. Thomas', our financial situation is healthy. We hope to end the year with small surplus.

The Christmas Fair was a wonderful event. I am pleased to report that our preliminary estimate of our gross proceeds are nearly \$3,000. About 200 people purchased something – a Christmas ornament, a baked good, jewelry, etc. If we add the Summer Fair gross proceeds of almost \$5,000, our fairs raised approximately \$8,000...thank you all who tirelessly worked to make both fairs such wonderful events.

"Blue" Christmas service

Aldersgate United Methodist Church in Rockland, ME is adding a new service to its Christmas programming this year. It will be a "Blue" Christmas service designed to reach those for whom the holiday season is a difficult time of year. It may be a hard time of year because of the loss of a family member, the loss of a job, the loss of a partner, sickness, depression, loneliness- or a host of other things which make this season painful. The message of the service: Christ's light coming in to the world. Appropriately, the service will be held on the darkest night of the year: December 21 at 7:00pm. This is an ecumenical service and open to all.

Lessons and Carols service December 30

There will be a traditional service of Christmas lessons and carols as the Ministry of the Word part of the service on the Sunday following Christmas. George Bickham will read a story by Paul Harvey at the sermon time, and the service will conclude

Today's Music

December 9, 2018, Advent 2

Our entrance hymn, Savior of the nations, come! is the earliest hymn (1523) written by Martin Luther (German, 1483-1546). Luther's hymn is a pretty close translation of the even earlier Fourth Century text, Veni redemptor gentium by Ambrose (340-397). Luther also very creatively took the plainchant tune to Veni redemptor gentium and effectively created what became the German Lutheran chorale. We have this plainchant at Hymn # 55, so you can compare them. At communion I play a piece based on this tune by Dietrich Buxtehude (Danish, 1637-1707). It is said that J. S. Bach walked 200 miles to hear Buxtehude play. For the postlude I play a piece also based on this tune by Johann Sebastian Bach (German, 1685-1750).

The sequence hymn is the lively Comfort, comfort ye my people, a meditation on Isaiah 40:1-8. We do not get to hear this familiar, comforting, text during Advent for this Year C so we'll sing it. The bouncy music we sing was probably written by Louis Bourgeois (Paris, 1510-1561) for Psalm 42 in the 1551 publication of the psalms he edited. In the German Lutheran tradition this same melody was associated with the text Freu Dich sehr, O meine Seele: today's sumptuous prelude by Sigfrid Karg-Elert (German, 1877-1933) is based on this tune. The hymn we sing during communion, What is the crying at Jordan? is a contemporary text written by Carol Christopher Drake, while a choir member at St. Mark's Church in Berkeley, California. In 1961, Margaret and Norman Mealy matched this text with a Gaelic tune, Dánta Dé, for their children's songbook, Sing for Joy.

The Choir sings the lively Advent anthem, Come, Thou Redeemer of the Earth, with a text once again by Ambrose and translated by J.M. Neale. Mark Schweizer (American, b. 1956) who composed this arrangement, is an American church musician, composer, writer and music professor. The tune, Puer nobis nascitur, is from a 15th Century manuscript from Trier. We have two different forms of it in

What's Where

Our Sunday School and Nursery rooms are located past the sun room. Turn right. The *Blue Room* is the Nursery & *Godly Play*; the *Yellow Room* is the *God, the Bible and Me* classroom. our hymnal: #98 which is closest to the original manuscript and #124 and #193 which are derived from the 1609 adaptation by **Michael Praetorius** (1571-1621). Schweizer has put together a three-part anthem (Sopranos, Altos, Men) in Praetorius' style.

May all this rich Advent music guide you on your path this week.
