Aldersgate United Methodist Church in Rockland, ME is adding a new service to its Christmas programming this year. It will be a "Blue" Christmas service designed to reach those for whom the holiday season is a difficult time of year. It may be a hard time of year because of the loss of a family member, the loss of a job, the loss of a partner, sickness, depression, loneliness- or a host of other things which make this season painful. The message of the service: Christ's light coming in to the world. Appropriately, the service will be held on the darkest night of the year: December 21 at 7:00pm. This is an ecumenical service and open to all.

There will be a traditional service of Christmas lessons and carols as the Ministry of the Word part of the 10:00 am service on the Sunday following Christmas. George Bickham will read a story by Paul Harvey at the sermon time, and the service will conclude with a Eucharist.

## Today's Music

December 16, 2018, Advent 3 We will hear echoes of the classic German Advent chorale, Sleepers, wake! (we sang this a few weeks ago on Advent 1) in the prelude based on this tune. Johann Sebastian Bach (German, 1685-1750) made a trio arrangement for the organ from the final movement of his Cantata #140. It's a trio because the right hand, left hand and pedal part are equal, as they would be in a trio of voices or instruments. To me it would not feel like Advent if I did not play this wonderful piece! It also would most definitely not feel like Advent if we did not sing O come, O come, Emmanuel. Each week a different choir member sings one stanza of this chant from the eighth century. Research to date claims the tune to originate in a fifteenth-century collection belonging to French Franciscan nuns. During communion I play a piece based on this chant by Gerald Near (American, b. 1942) I find the compositions written by Near to be wellcrafted. I learn and play pieces by Near based on chant or hymn tunes. I also find that his music clearly underscores the texts from these chants and hymns.

We then enter worship singing a tenth century text, *Hark! A thrilling voice is sounding*. As in *Sleepers, wake!* And *O come, O come, Emmanuel*, this hymn is brimming with scriptural references. **William Henry Monk** (English, 1823-1889) composed the tune we sing in 1850. As the sequence hymn we sing a metrical paraphrase of today's *Canticle 9: The First Song of Isaiah*. I love the folk-like setting we sing today by **Ray W. Urwin** (American, b. 1950) who composed it to this text in 1980 as a wedding gift!

The communion hymn was written in 1930 by the poet **James Lewis Milligan** (English/Canadian, 1876-1961). The lilting tune for this text was written by the English/Canadian organist/ choirmaster **Hugh Bancroft** (1904-1988) in a half-hour on a piano in the church basement!

The Choir sings the florid anthem written by the English clergyman and hymn writer, Henry Ramsden Bramley (1833-1917). Bramley and Sir John Stainer collaborated on the 1871 publication *Christmas Carols*, New and Old: They are credited with reviving the 19<sup>th</sup> century Victorian Christmas Carol; many of which we still sing today. The soaring music was written by the Irish composer Charles Wood (1866-1926). Wood studied with Charles Villiers Stanford and Frank Bridge. He taught harmony and counterpoint: one of his students was Ralph Vaughan Williams. Wood also composed anthems, communion services and canticles and collaborated on many hymn and carol collections.

We go forth into the world singing a hymn resonating today's reading from Philippians, *Rejoice! Rejoice believers*. This early 18<sup>th</sup> century text by **Laurentius Laurenti** (German, 1660-1720) sounds fresh today. It is paired to an 18<sup>th</sup> century Welsh tune of unknown origin: and possibly an English folk-tune which migrated to Wales! Then I play **Marcel Dupré**'s broad setting of the chant, *Ave Maris Stella* (Hail Mary, Star of the Sea).
