The Rector's class will begin again February 3.


Feb 3 & 10—Angels in the Bible/ In our Midst—Class/ discussion

## **Today's Music**

The Second Sunday after Epiphany January 20, 2019

The lilting prelude is by **C. Armstrong Gibbs** (English, 1889-1960): it truly is a lullaby.

Gibbs came to composing late in his thirties, eventually studied with Charles Wood and Ralph Vaughan Williams and collaborated with the poet, Walter de la Mare. During communion I play another lullaby-like piece by **Gordon Phillips** (English, 1908-1991).

Phillips compiled the seven volume *Tallis to Wesley Series*, which gave organists around the world the opportunity to access and play Early English Organ music. Gibbs' piece is based on the 15<sup>th</sup> century English carol, a.k.a. *Coventry Carol.* Phillips' piece is based on a tune dated between 1460-1490. The tune name, *This Endrys Nyght* means "the other night." (You can find this hymn with an 1865 American text in our hymnal #116.)

We enter worship singing Charles Wesley's (1707-1788) beloved text, first published in 1740. The tune, Ratisbon, started life as a 16<sup>th</sup> century German hymn to Mary, and through the adaptation of many (including William H. Havergal) morphed into the tune we sing today! I love the fascinating paths the hymn texts and tunes take! During communion we sing the favorite hymn of many people: Let all mortal flesh keep silence. The text is ancient: fifth-century. The tune, *Picardy*, is thought to be a French folk tune dating from the 17<sup>th</sup> century. Ralph Vaughan Williams had one of his many strokes of genius when he put this text and tune together and gave it a plainsong-like simple accompaniment. Brilliant! We go forth into the world singing the rousing hymn for mission by George Wallace Briggs (English, 1875-1959). The tune, St. Joan (named for the composer's wife) was written by Percy E.B. Coller (English, 1895-?) specifically for this text. As with our entrance hymn we sing of Christ as the world's true light and dav-star clear and bright.

The Choir sings a chant based on the writings of Hildegard von Bingen (German, 1098-1179). This hymn to the Holy Spirit ends with the Latin text Laus tibi spiritus which means Praise to you, O Spirit. Mary Louise Bringle compiled the text and the tune beautifully. Barry Rose (English, b. 1934) arranged this setting. This anthem points us to today's reading from 1 Corinthians. We then go forth into the world while I play a piece by Johann Heinrich Buttstedt (German, 1666-1727) who is not exactly a household word! Buttstedt was a student of Johann Pachelbel. This piece is based on the Epiphany hymn (see #131 in the hymnal) From heaven came the angel bright. It is a fitting finish to today's worship.
