

We have many lovely plants in the sun room area and corridor. These have always been watered by dedicated volunteers, but our current volunteer can no longer do it.

Does anyone consider themselves good at watering and would you like to take on this ministry? This is a good ministry for anyone: singles, couples, married with or without children. This is a good ministry for people who don't have much time to offer, or need a very flexible schedule.

If we can't find another volunteer we will no longer be able to have plants in the corridor or sunroom, so if you are a plant whisperer, we'd love to hear from you!

Today's Music February 10, 2019 Fifth Sunday After Epiphany

If you were here at St. Thomas' last Sunday, February 3rd, you will have heard the demonstration of the organ cipher: which sounds as if a gremlin got into the organ chamber and was playing the bagpipes very badly! I have never encoun-

tered a cipher like this one. Until now, ciphers I encountered on any of the pipe organs I have been privileged to play have been from a soft flute pipe, usually a high pitched one; and the tricks we organists have up our surplices will eliminate the sound. Ciphers can occur when we have wildly fluctuating temperatures and humidity, so this may remedy itself this week. I had a long phone conversation with Brian Mattias from Potter-Rathbun Organ Tuners in Rhode Island. They are scheduled in three weeks to come for their twice-yearly tuning of the organ. (They cannot come before then; it would be cost-prohibitive to have them come to address this one problem.)

We are fortunate to have a good piano in the church; a Chickering grand given to us by the Langhornes. Pianos do not have the capability of leading and supporting congregational singing: that is one of the reasons pipe organs developed in churches. So, if we need to continue using the piano for a few weeks, please do your best to sing with gusto! It would also help if you could temporarily abandon your favorite, comfortable pew and move up front! Playing the organ music I have planned is problematic for one major reason: organ music is usually on three staves treble (right hand), bass(left hand) and bass for the pedals(both feet). Sometimes the tune will be in the pedals, most of the time it is a totally independent part. So trying to figure out how to play all of that with two hands (and missing two feet!) is more than a challenge!

Our entrance and dismissal hymns are both rousing! Christ for the world we sing! The Rev. Samuel Wolcott (1813-1886) wrote this very ecumenical text in 1869. It is paired with the tune by the Italian composer, violinist, teacher and conductor working in London, Felice de Giardini (1716-1796). (The tune is named for Moscow, where Giardini died.) As the sequence hymn we sing the moving text by Josiah Conder (1789-1855). As a child,

Conder lost the vision in his right eye due to smallpox: this did not stop him from educating himself in his father's bookstore. He went on to be an editor as well as writer of prose, poems and hymns. This text is paired with the lovely tune by **William Boyce** (1711-1779). Boyce was an organist, conductor and composer of both orchestral and sacred choral music. He succeeded as a musician in spite of his impaired hearing. After being dismissed in 1764 due to his increasing deafness, Boyce set to the task of compiling the works of his teacher, **Maurice Greene** (1696-1755).

During communion we sing the lilting early 19th century American folkhymn, Come, thou fount of every blessing, written in 1758 by Robert Robinson (1735-1790). This text has been paired with the tune, Nettleton, since its inception. The tune appeared in many 19th century collections under many different names, sometimes in two parts, sometimes in 4/4 time. It was very popular. We go forth singing the tune heard by Thomas Olivers (1725-1799) in the Great Synagogue in London; and then transcribed by hymn into an English hymn. The tune is named for the cantor of the Great Synagogue, Meier Leoni, who wrote out this traditional Hebrew melody. Many hymns wind up memorializing hymn writers and composers for centuries.
