

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


To Mothers Everywhere

Today's Music

Good Shepherd Sunday occurs each year on the Fourth Sunday of Easter in **all three years** of our Lectionary. The 23rd Psalm is appointed, and the readings and Gospel also reflect aspects of The Lamb and The Good Shepherd. Hymn #343, *Shepherd of Souls*, is an example of a 'composite' hymn; with the text by more than one author. One of the authors we know of is **James Montgomery** (1771-1854) since the text was published in the Moravian Hymnal of 1849. **John Bacchus Dykes** (1823-1876) composed the tune, *St. Agnes* for the text, *Jesus, the very thought of thee* (which we have using yet a different tune at Hymn #642). These hymn texts and tunes do get around! **Emma Lou Diemer** (American, b. 1927) is a church musician and prolific composer who has

written many works for orchestra, chamber ensemble, keyboard, voice, chorus and electronic ensemble. Her fine prelude is based on Dykes' tune.

Our exuberant entrance hymn, *Ye holy angels bright*, echoing Psalm 148, was first published in **Richard Baxter's** (1615-1691) *The Poor Man's Family Book* in 1672. The title page of this publication states "Forms of Prayer, praise and Catechism for the use of Ignorant (sic) Families that need them." [I think we need to read that with a lot of historical perspective!] We sing this to the tune by **John Darwall** (1731-1789). We are blessed with four hymn paraphrases of the 23rd Psalm: #645, #646, #663 and #664. I asked The Choir to vote on which one to sing today, and #645 won. *St. Columba* is a beautiful Irish melody collected by George Petri around 1855. This means the tune was around a long time; Petri heard it and included it in a collection.

This morning The Choir sings two anthems. As a sequence hymn, we sing *Mothering God*. Jean W. Janzen was inspired by the writings of **Julian of Norwich** (1342-1417), was a mystic and wrote *Revelations of Divine Love*. Sharon Marion Hershey, an active church musician and composer in Denver, honored this text with a simple, clear setting of music. Then we sing **John Rutter's** (English, b. 1945) setting of the 15th Century text (by an unknown author), *Jesu, my love, my joy, my rest*. Rutter is a prolific composer, conductor, editor, arranger and record producer. He has written many, many carols which have become a beloved part of church choir repertoires.

Ed Shindle sings a jewel of a lullaby by **Max Reger** (German, 1873-1916). Reger was another extremely prolific composer; accomplished in a relatively short life of 43 years.

We go forth singing **Franz Joseph Haydn's** (Austrian, 1732-1809) stirring music with **John Newton's** (English, 1725-1807) text inspired by Isaiah 33:20-21. And, yes, this is the same John Newton who wrote the text, *Amazing Grace*, after his amazing conversion from his life as a slave-ship captain. **William Mathias** (Welsh,

1934-1992) professor, conductor and composer wrote many carols, anthems, settings for service music as well as organ music which continue to be popular and wear well. He wrote the sprightly postlude.
