

Applied Christianity: Perplexity

On Tuesday morning I found myself in the Wood Street parking lot, sitting in the car, engine still running, listening to the radio in tears. I was listening to a report about children between the ages of 5 months and 17 years, being held by their abductors in a high-security facility. These children were forced to sleep on mats on a cement floor, with thin blankets, and were being given minimal food. They were disciplined by their captors for crying or reacting in fear by taking away their pads and blankets, leaving them on bare cement. The children were still wearing the unwashed clothes they had been wearing when they had been taken, days — even weeks — before. They had not been able to wash themselves or their garments. This report related accounts of untreated illnesses, lack of sanitation, and even information about all the children in one facility being forced to use the same comb used by a child with lice.

The irony is that children are being incarcerated in the name of "civic safety" at the direction of our own government. These are children of refugee families, refugees *legally* seeking asylum in this country.

These children, some as young as 3 months, have been forcibly removed from their parents or relatives and detained. There has been little or no *continues on next page*

provision (proper record-keeping, for example) that would enable these children eventually to be reunited with their parents. They fled disaster, only to find it here. If this mistreatment were happening in a private home, a school, or an orphanage anywhere else in this country, it would require action by child welfare services.

There is an enormous difference between simply holding a family in one place while they await proper processing, and separating children from their families and incarcerating them in such callous and dire conditions. What will the future lives and mental health of these children be like as a result of this kind of treatment?

For Christians, this is an intolerable situation. We claim to follow the teaching of Jesus, whose primary lesson, given by him many times and in many ways — and reaffirmed each week in our churches — is to love our neighbor as ourselves. These asylum seekers and their children are our neighbors.

How can we get this mistreatment of the innocents to stop? Please join me in a forum discussion in the Guild Room at the end of Coffee Hour today.
