

# **Letter to the Community**

Blessings, people of St. Thomas'! Let's begin with new things that I need to announce:

- OUR CHURCH BUILDING IS CLOSED. The Diocese has asked that all traffic in the church be curtailed. If people MUST go in, they may only go in 1 person at a time. They must sign in and out with the date and time. This is for tracking, in case someone should become ill. We need to know where they've been—and who else might be at risk. All people must disinfect their hands and the pen coming and going.
- Susie is working at the church for very limited hours, and remotely.
- Jon is nearly finished disinfecting the building. He will only be there sporadically to check the building.
- I am working from home.

Here's what the Bishop says: all churches are discouraged from streaming Eucharist services, and videos and live streams need to be done with only one person present in the room. The Bishop encourages all of us to look toward the day when we all come together again for Holy Communion. He asks that we take advantage of all the other services in the prayer book at this time. If it helps—he says—we can think of ourselves as being "in exile." Hoping that things will soon be back to normal is understandable, but not

likely. It is very possible we won't be back in the church until mid-May. Meanwhile:

- I'm doing Noonday Prayers Monday- Friday live on Facebook
- Compline on Wednesdays and Sundays at 8 p.m. live on Facebook
- I encourage you to pray either Morning or Evening Prayer.

The Bishop says we might all think about *moving to Washington for Easter*—not literally—but online. It would be cool to have thousands of people all worshiping together virtually. Then, call each other on the phone and wish each other Happy Easter! Don't forget the kids!

Our watchwords for this time are Creativity and Adaptability. Instead of focusing on what you are missing (and believe me, I understand...) focus on what we are finding out!
