

### Streaming Service from St. Thomas' Beginning June 7

St. Thomas' will attempt to stream the service of Holy Eucharist from the church this Sunday, June 7. We have not completed the upgrades to WiFi, sound and camera yet—so it may be pretty rough. Bear with us. It's a work in progress.

During the month of June, our plan

is to have Sunday services in a format such as the Diocese uses: with people singing and reading or doing the prayers from home, and doing the "spiritual" Eucharist from the church with Clarissa on the organ and the Rector celebrating and preaching. Those pieces might come together for the 14<sup>th</sup> or might have to wait until the 21<sup>st</sup>. If you would like to participate by video, you will need a camera or phone that supports video with sound, and be willing to learn how to upload it to the person pulling it all together. If that sounds like something you would love to try, please let the office or the Rector know by email. It would be nice to see more of our adults and children participate in the service.

If you miss seeing the inside of the church, please join us this Sunday at 10 a.m. via the Facebook link on the website or in the email that will be sent. You do NOT need to be a Facebook user to watch this live.

### **Pastoral Care**

Abby and I have been getting more requests lately to stop by and see people, and offer pastoral support in person—to be more "out and about." More people than ever are lonely and anxious during this time, especially those living alone—like my mom.

I haven't been able to get into my mom's apartment complex because of COVID-19 protocols. Of course, I really want to see my mom, but I am grateful that her community is being

so careful. Once the coronavirus gets into a community, it spreads quickly.

And *you parishioners of St. Thomas*' are my community.

Many of the people who ask us to visit don't, or can't, wear masks. Some will want to get much closer than 6 feet. Some are already seeing some of their nearer neighbors. Since some restaurants are open, it's hard to understand why we can't we share a meal together, too, right?

It's because the coronavirus is tricky. One really dangerous thing about it is that people can be exposed—from a trip to the store, or a neighborhood BBQ, or friends stopping by—and then be asymptomatic for up to 14 days before they show symptoms of COVID-19, the illness the virus causes. During those 14 days they are highly contagious. Abby and I don't want to inadvertently bring something to you that could sicken or harm you in any way. We also don't want to pick up the virus from someone who appears to be well, and then bring it to others.

You are our priority.

We will not be making in-person pastoral or social visits to our beloved community until at least July, unless someone is hospitalized or dying. We need to see what the influx of tourists to Camden and surrounding areas does to the number of people who become infected during this first month of summer. Because the coronavirus can lie dormant for so long, we'll need some time to see if any trends form.

We hope we can see you soon. But—just like I'm doing with my own mother—we will continue to distance ourselves because we don't want to put anyone at risk. We are, however, always here by phone or email or text. It's not the same, we know. We REALLY know. We miss you, too.

But remember that no matter how far away we are from each other, we are still connected in tangible and intangible ways through the Spirit of God that flows between us. We are one in the Spirit. And they'll know we are Christians by our love of one another, especially right now. *Lisa*+
