2022 ANNUAL PARISH MEETING MINUTES

St. Thomas Episcopal Church February 6, 2022 167th Annual Meeting (Hybrid meeting)

The meeting opened in prayer by The Reverend Canon Lisa Fry, Rector, at 10:19 am.

The rector is proud of all of us, as we have streamed Services successfully which will include streaming Wednesday Healing Services, Ash Wednesday Service as well as Holy Week Services. What we have accomplished throughout the Pandemic will affect future generations. This year Wi-Fi was installed in the Church which makes these solutions possible—and more possible going forward. The Parish tried new ways of doing things and have adapted. The Diocese cannot believe all that we have accomplished. We continue to offer on YouTube Noonday prayer during the week and Compline twice a week with a wonderful following. Thank you to each of us for putting forth effort. We have been able to pivot quickly and in turn this meets the needs of everyone.

Senior Warden, Elizabeth Moran: There is work to be carried out on a revision of the bylaws and we are seeking volunteers to help accomplish this project.

A motion was made by Carlos Mello and seconded by Donovan to accept the 166th Annual Meeting Minutes of January 2021. All were in favor.

Treasurer for 2021, Terry Mello: The income was lower as were the expenses. We received \$41,000 from the Diocese (PPP) which left us with a surplus of \$12,000. The Endowment is in decent shape. Operational Expenses: Donations were down. Please consider pledging if you have not done so already. Terry thanked everyone for allowing her to be Treasurer for the last several years. Thank you, Terry, for all your work for the parish.

Treasurer going forward, Jim Ebbert: Compared to last year the percentage of income/revenue from pledges has increased. The Givers of Record have decreased. An expectation of using the trailing 3 years as an average of \$46,000 or 5% would have been used from the endowment and this will be included in the budget for 2022. The Diocesan assessment is \$32,280 for 2022. An added expense will be an outside bookkeeper at the cost of \$7,000. Facilities Expense: considering the upcoming energy deliveries (including oil) reflects the best estimate. The budget for this year is \$255,000 which is a \$16,000 deficit. Last year before PPP we had close to a \$30,000 deficit. If the Budget increases additional money will come out of the endowment. In 2016 the endowment was not touched and in 2020 only a small amount came out of the endowment due to the PPP loan. Please pledge especially if you follow us on YouTube.

Election of New Vestry Members: This has been a rough couple of years and all Vestry members were thanked by the rector for their ability to work through the many difficult facets of change. Two people have agreed to join the Vestry: Sarah Groman and Kendra Watkins. A motion was made by Edmund

Hartt and seconded by Jan Lyle to accept the nominations. The vote was unanimous to accept Sarah and Kendra as Vestry members.

We are considering reducing the size of the Vestry – electing 2 people a year instead of 3 people per year. No questions were asked at this time.

The Rector adjourned the meeting - discussion on Bell Tower Project began.

RECTOR

This is the first year since 2019 that we've had a whole year of worship—LIVE—in the church. It'll be a little while longer until we can say that we were live AND we streamed every service to our community and guests. We are getting closer to that goal with the assistance of Terry Mello and Luke Watkins, but we could use a couple more volunteers at both services. I would also like us to have the ability—if there is no volunteer on any given Sunday, to have the ability to just turn on the camera at the back of the church and let it run. We'll get there. It was only 3 years ago that this relatively new technology entered St. Thomas'.

We have welcomed 13 new parishioners this year. Since the pandemic began, we have added nearly 20 new members through our door, and so this year we have called together a newcomer welcome committee to try and ensure that the new members have a chance to meet fellow parishioners, vestry and clergy and get involved with whatever interests them.

A lot happened in St. Thomas parish in 2022: the vestry put a committee in place to look over and update our by-laws for St. Thomas'. The task force included Elizabeth Moran, Eileen Morelli, Kendra Watkins and me, and we have sent the adaptations of the By Laws to the diocese for review. We expect to vote on them as a parish very soon.

The Episcopal Church and the dioceses that comprise it have been tackling the subject of racial reconciliation and justice work. It was the subject of debate and resolutions at the General Convention this year, and a class called Sacred Ground was developed to facilitate discussion within churches. In preparation for Sacred Ground, our church offered a rector's class to read and discuss a book called, "This Book is Antiracist". It was challenging and eye-opening. Sacred Ground is a class that has been offered to the Episcopal Church to tackle the subject of racial justice and reconciliation. I'd like us to offer this to our parishioners and the larger community with the aid of a specially trained facilitator.

2022 saw the return of the Easter Vigil to St. Thomas, as we hosted the church year's most dramatic service. We had a full house as we hosted 4 congregations to participate in this glorious, ancient service, listened to our faith story and lit the fire of Christ in the crossing of our church.

Then, in May, the Fry's went on vacation and got Covid. Many parishioners followed suit, and we had a cluster of families go out of town, become ill, and live to tell the tale. It is a tribute to our hardiness

that it hardly fazed us. It definitely annoyed us, but our booster shots helped make the illnesses relatively mild.

2022 saw the General Convention return to our church—a year late and with MANY precautions. As I told you when I returned, it changed my life. It allowed me to see our church with all its diversity: many races, genders, neurodiversity's, ages, experience in church—it was glorious. We have a new director of the house of deputies: Julia Ayala Harris. And in 2024 we will elect a new Presiding Bishop. I was once again elected to be a part of Maine's delegation.

We opened a new lending library located at the far end of our Sunroom. It contains books not affiliated with our formal library that are free for everyone to take home without any sign out procedure, just returning them when finished.

We have started having coffee hour again, and it has been a resounding success. A huge thank you goes to Ruth Tolman and Kate Jackson for their unflagging support for this fellowship opportunity. Another huge thank you goes to our food volunteers who have outdone themselves again and again, and everyone is happy to have time to chat, catch up, and chase things down with swords. (If you don't understand that—you might want to drop in on coffee hour! \odot)

After a small hiccup, we have a great new Sexton, Tony Coyne. He does more to keep our building clean and set up in 10 hours a week than I thought humanly possible.

Mini ministries are very popular: these are small things that need doing around the church, which we publicize as needed. Thank you all—mini volunteers!

The bishop came for his annual visitation, talked with the vestry and rector at length, preached and celebrated at both services, and was feted with food three times that weekend. At the end of it all, he commented on how much he'd really enjoyed his stay. "Visiting your church has been so much fun!"

The Bookkeepers who have been working with us since last January are doing a great job.

With AA's financial assistance, we refinished the floors in parish hall, guild room and front hallway.

Now on to upcoming events.

This will be the year to get a paid Administrator back on board for 10 hours a week. Our volunteers are doing a fabulous job, but there are things that are still falling through the cracks. Our church deserves someone who can keep track of the many things that need to get done, and to delegate them, or do them.

I'm excited about my impending Sabbatical – not just because I will be taking time to rest, reflect and recharge, as well studying "New Ways to be the Church"—but I'm also excited about what you will be experiencing.

The vestry and I have discussed various scenarios of what we could do for worship from May through August. Here's what we have decided—and why:

- We'll worship together during those 4 months, one service at 9:00am.
- We'll do a mixture of Rite One and Rite Two—doing one for a month, then the other, then
 repeat.
- We'll have 4 different supply clergy, one for each month.

We could have just continued with our usual two services, but the vestry and I think it's important that the congregations have this chance to meet and mingle- get to know each other. While I'm away, the church will feel fuller and more vibrant with all of you worshiping together. I also think it's important to have each service shift its time—to make this more of a shared experience. Together you will encourage each other. Together you will get to experience the breadth of services. Together you will make new friends, enjoy one another's strengths, and enjoy the new Celebrants! Together you will experience our coffee hours! Envision this time as one where the only thing you'll have to worry about —is making room for a crowd! Don't worry, I'm not secretly planning to permanently go to one service. In September, we'll go back to 7:30 and 10:00, Rite 1 and Rite 2.

My rector's class came to a close in December, but we will soon be adding a women's book group. If you are at all interested, please let me know.

We continue partnering with the world's best AA group: opening our doors 7 days a week for meetings, making our spaces flexible on major holidays for special meetings and events, and they continue to contribute in by assisting us with financing the floor refinishing, extra money to assist with heating costs, and most recently—offering to help with small projects around the building.

Episcopal 101 has begun, and we discuss things unique to the Episcopal Church like the 3-legged stool, the number of sacraments, the Elizabethan Settlement... It's fun, it's interesting, and the people are great. Come join us on the 3rd Sunday of each month—taking a break during the summer in 2023.

We officially have more children attending St. Thomas than any other Episcopal Church in the area. Our Christmas pageant was written, acted and directed by youth with the assistance of the rector and parents. Our new Sunday School class: Sunday Theatre—is off to a messy, boisterous and fun start. It will continue to meet the first and second Sundays of each month—with a break for summer vacation May-August.

We are brainstorming ways to bring theatre to St. Thomas'. We already share our space with the Camden Shakespeare Festival, but wouldn't it be fun -and a good way to spread the gospel -with the visual and performing arts as well? The goal: to involve people from the community in this endeavor and, in doing so, to touch the hearts and minds of our artists and audience. Stay tuned for more. As you can see, we have a lot on our plate for the upcoming year. Remember to enjoy your summer of worship, treat each other well, and always remember: Jesus loves you.

SENIOR WARDEN

From my perspective in 2022 as Senior Warden, it was a transitional year as we moved closer to normalcy after a very difficult period. Led by our Rector, we returned to in-person services every Sunday as well as in-person Vestry meetings and also various committee meetings. However we continued our online services on designated Sundays as well as during the week. This enabled our homebound parishioners to attend worship services. Many thanks to Carlos and Terry Mello for making worship online possible.

How did the year unfold for me as Senior Warden? As a member of the Building and Grounds Committee, I identified areas outside in our gardens that needed attention. We hope to create a

maintenance plan for the All Soul's Garden as well as design appropriate signage to remember those parishioners who rest there.

Last winter and spring, work began on organizing the church archives in our dedicated room upstairs above the parish hall. We were motivated to do so by a special visit by the grandson of Father Ralph Hayden who was the rector of St. Thomas from 1919 to 1933 and who chaired the construction programs for our church building and parish hall as well as for the Camden Public Library and Camden Amphitheatre.

A recent project has been an inventory and replacement of our worn Prayer Books. We are asking parishioners to help with this by donating funds to purchase new copies that may be given in memory or in honor of loved ones.

A new ministry is that of the "Birthday Card" ministry now that we have an up-to-date membership list.

Finally, the Rector and I hope to re-vitalize Altar Guild by seeking out and training new members. Also an inventory of our "treasures" needs to be done for insurance purposes as well as accurate record-keeping.

I would like to thank all the members of the parish for their love and support during this past year. My family was strengthened by your prayers and well-wishes.

JUNIOR WARDEN

The Building and Grounds Committee and I have made good progress this past year.

- The roof plans for the chapel are just about complete. We are beginning to find qualified contractors to do the deconstruction and rebuilding.
- The floors in the Parish Hall and connecting hallways were refinished last spring. We urge all to not drag tables over the floor.
- The Wood St. entrance side of the building was repainted. It looks much better.
- The outside lighting on the Chestnut St. side of the church has been somewhat addressed. It works, but it needs an electric eye switch installed in the circuit, to turn it on and off as needed.
- We had several of the ventilator stained glass windows rebuilt, along with one in the chapel. Over time the lead between the pieces of glass oxidizes and expands, causing the windows to bulge and eventually fail. We had all of the windows assessed, in the future more will have to be rebuilt, as they last roughly 110 years.
- After review, the vestry has authorized the removal of the Vulcan stove in the kitchen, to be replaced with two domestic models that are easier to operate and will not pollute the indoor air.

Going forward, more exterior painting needs to be done. Replacing the gas fired water heater with a heat pump one should be considered. And the chapel roof project will continue.

2022 Financial Review

As we enter 2022, we want to take this opportunity to thank you all for your continued support of St. Thomas'. The St. Thomas' community, once again, has answered the call. Your support enabled us to send \$3,100 to charities, ranging from the Camden Area Christian Food Pantry, Loaves and Fishes Soup Kitchen, and other special needs of our community. In 2022 we awarded scholarships totaling \$7,500 to three of our students to help with their educational expenses. When we began the year, we projected a \$20,400 Operating Deficit. That projection did not come to pass because of your support and the work the staff and our many volunteers continue to do to keep our expenses down.

Following are two reports for your information— 2022 Statement of Activity and Statement of Financial Position (2022 and 2021). The 2022 Results and 2023 Budget report can be found on page 10. As you can see, our financial position is healthy as we enter 2022. We would not be in this position without your support.

I want to personally take to opportunity to thank Rev. Lisa, Wardens, Vestry and the Finance and Endowment Committee for their support and trust you continue to provide to me. "Alone we can do so little; together we can do so much." – Helen Keller

2023 Budget Projection

Each year the Treasurer, Vestry and Finance Committee work together to develop a reasonable budget for the current year. This year was especially difficult. As you can see in the below presentation, the projected Pledge and Donations are down by 6.7% and Expenses are up by 12.8%. In order to present a balanced 2023 Budget, it was agreed that we would use the undesignated surpluses from 2015, 2016, 2019 and 2020, totaling \$38,370. We will continue to do our best to be good stewards of our church finances. "Give, and it will be given to you. OFFICE VOLUNTEERS

The volunteers open the church when the office is open; answer the phone and emails; greet visitors; proof and edit Tidings; mail Tidings and sermons to shut-ins without Internet service; proof, post, print, and fold the bulletins; manage the service-assignment schedule; schedule events; email readings and prayers of the people to readers; order supplies; and perform all the other tasks that any office administrator might be asked to handle.

BIBLE STUDY

We have been meeting entirely online by Zoom since early in the pandemic. Most participants join the meeting by computer. One person calls in by phone (landline. Those with smartphones and computers can see each other on screen; everyone can be heard.

Every Wednesday morning St. Thomas' Church sends out the log-in link for our meeting via Mailchimp. We meet from 11 AM to noon on that day, for a very lively informal discussion of the scripture readings for the coming Sunday. We encourage participants to log in a bit early, about 10:45, to allow for occasional log-in problems. All enter via the Zoom "waiting room." The host or co-host brings each participant into the meeting from there. Come join us online!

This past year, we've had about 10 regular participants, including one of our former parishioners from Michigan who is our co-host, as well as another person from a different local parish. We do look forward to when we can resume our accustomed meeting around the St. Thomas' conference table, with refreshments - but with the added ability to still allow folks to participate from wherever they are, via Zoom. Whether coming from a distance or ill at home, folks can continue to participate.

CAMDEN AREA CHRISTIAN FOOD PANTRY

St. Thomas' is one of the five churches in Camden supporting the Camden Area Christian Food Pantry. Others in the group are Chestnut Street Baptist, First Congregational, John Street Methodist, and Our Lady of Good Hope. During 2022 food was provided each month to more than 200 families living in Appleton, Camden, Hope, Lincolnville, Rockport, Searsmont, Union, and Washington. Since its inception in 2001, the food pantry has been run with no paid staff. Our volunteers spend hundreds of hours each month procuring food, stocking shelves, and distributing food and personal items to all who come, regardless of their personal circumstances.

St. Thomas' is a very active supporter of the Pantry. During 2022 members of our congregation donated over \$1,900 in cash as well as a considerable quantity of non-perishable groceries and personal hygiene products.

JUNIOR WARDEN: BR. DONOVAN BOWLEY, BSG



Donovan has been a member at St. Thomas for the past 16 years, since retiring back to Maine, where his father's family has been since the 1740s. Here at St. Thomas', he has been a choir member, Eucharistic Minister/Acolyte, Worship Leader, and Eucharistic Visitor and Pastoral Associate, as well as serving on the Vestry and on the recent Search Committee for the Rector. He convenes the Wednesday Bible Study group, and after taking the Education for Ministry course led by Rosalee Glass, assisted her in EfM for several years.

He is a life-professed member of the Brotherhood of St. Gregory.
